

AGE 60 & OVER TUITION

Tuition is waived for individuals age 60 and over, and they pay only the fees for a class. Only in-district students are eligible for this special.

PAYMENT OPTIONS

Payment Plans - May be set up through the Business Office with a \$100 down payment and paid in full by midterm in three installments: August 20, September 22, and October 15. Drop date is November 5.

Students receiving financial aid - Make sure your financial aid file is complete; otherwise, a payment plan will be required. Book vouchers will be available to qualifying students once the file is complete.

\$20 PM Tuition Reduction

If you register for a class beginning at 6PM or later, a tuition discount of \$20 will be applied for each credit hour (instead of \$100). This discount is available to indistrict students only, and you must be enrolled in no more than 4 credit hours per semester.

This tuition reduction applies only to classes containing college credit. Non-credit classes (such as community education) will be charged the set cost.


"How do I register?" Here are a few ways:

Phone - To schedule an appointment with academic advisor, give us a call at 618-842-3711. You may also start the registration process for a class by calling. Please use the course reference number (CRN) for an easier registration process.

In-Person - Our staff is happy to assist you with registration in our Student Services Office (Building #1 on the campus map on page 2 of this booklet). Regular office hours are 7:30AM - 4:30PM. Summer hours 7:30AM-4:00PM and will begin May 11, 2020.

Online - Using your personal Entrata account, you may register for classes online at www.entrata.iecc.edu.

UNDERSTANDING THE SCHEDULE



Student Schedule

Students will receive a copy of their schedule at the time of registration, and it is also available for viewing or printing through Entrata. You may receive a schedule by mail if you register for a class over the phone. You must bring your schedule to the Bookstore when picking up textbooks.

How to Add or Drop a Course

Students working toward a degree or certificate should contact their advisor to add or drop a course (schedule changes may affect financial aid). All other students may contact the Records Office in Student Services or by calling 618-842-3711.

What is an Online or Hybrid Class?

Online classes are completed 100% online. The student will never meet face-to-face in a classroom.

Hybrid classes blend face-to-face classroom instruction with online learning. Typically, students meet every other week for a hybrid course.

Students who enroll in either an online or hybrid course are required to complete the Intro to Online Learning class (CIS 1104), which is a free online tutorial through Entrata. All online and hybrid courses have a \$35 course fee.

What is an Entrata Account?

Entrata is a student portal that enables students to access e-mails, unofficial transcripts, schedules, grades, fee assessments, and more. Students can also use Entrata to register online or make online payments.

All students are required to open an Entrata account. For questions about Entrata, you may contact our Records Office at 618-842-3711.

ADULT EDUCATION

Get Ready for the GED Exam!

Frontier Community College offers free GED Test Prep classes throughout the area. These 8-week classes review each of the subjects on the computerized GED exam (math, writing, reading, science, social studies, and the Constitution), as well as job preparation skills. After completing the GED Test Prep classes, students can take the computerized GED exam on any of the IECC campuses (FCC, Lincoln Trail College, Olney Central College, & Wabash Valley College).

GED Test Prep is offered every 8 weeks on campus or in an area near you. For your convenience, we offer on-site registrations and walk you through the registration process. Look below to see where we're bringing classes next.

Prepare for College or the Workforce

After completing the GED Test Prep courses and passing the exam, Transition Skills courses will assist students with the next steps. These classes are designed for GED graduates and help with job preparation or college enrollment. Students will first evaluate their personal interests to determine which field of study or work is best suited for them.

Students enrolling in college will complete an application, sign up for financial aid, and review programs of study. BASIC NURSE ASSISTANT (CNA)

7-Credit Certificate



Frontier Community College offers a one-semester Basic Nurse Assistant Training Program in Fairfield. Students meet on FCC's campus for classroom lecture, and clinical hours are completed at Fairfield Memorial Hospital. Enrollment is very limited, so interested individuals should apply soon.

A Certified Nurse Assistant (CNA) is responsible for basic care services, such as bathing, grooming, feeding, checking vital signs, and assisting nurses with medical equipment. CNAs provide important social and emotional support to their patients and relay all important information to nurses. Employment may be found in hospitals, nursing homes, and home healthcare services.

NURSING (RN) Two-Year Associate Degree

The Associate Degree in Nursing Program is offered on FCC's campus through Olney Central College and Illinois Eastern Community Colleges.

The Department of Nursing on FCC's campus is located inside the Learning Resource Center. There are multiple classrooms utilized for lectures, and a simulation lab allows for hands-on learning. Clinical rotations are completed at area hospitals, and students get to experience nursing in a variety of departments.





Enrollment for the Fall 2020 Associate Degree in Nursing Program has already closed, but interested individuals can apply for the 2021 entry date toward the end of this year.

CERTIFIED MEDICAL ASSISTANT

Two-Year Associate in Applied Science Degree

The Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) program trains students to perform a variety of both clerical and clinical duties in a health-related setting. For those interested in the healthcare industry but uncomfortable with in-depth patient interaction or medical procedures, the CMA program is a great balance of duties. Over four semesters, students will develop the skills of managing patient records, processing insurance forms, taking vitals, collecting specimens, assisting with first aid, and more. Halfway through the program, students will complete an internship with a local healthcare facility to gain hands-on, real-world experience.







EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The healthcare industry is rapidly growing and evolving, which has fueled the demand for positions related to the CMA program. Graduates can find jobs in hospitals, doctor's offices, clinics, and more. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the job outlook for Certified Medical Assistants is projected to grow 23 percent by 2028, much faster than the average job growth.

Upon completion of the degree, graduates can take the CCMA/CMAA exam through the National Healthcareer Association. Students will also be eligible to sit for the Certified Phlebotomy Technician and Certified EKG Technician tests, expanding your career opportunities.

ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEMS

One-Year Certificate







The Electrical Distribution Systems (EDS) Program prepares individuals to build, repair, and maintain overhead and underground electrical distribution systems. Students also receive special training in pole climbing, cross arm construction, and hurt man rescue. Classes meet just three days per week, allowing students to maintain a job, manage other responsibilities, and commute from longer distances.

The EDS Program is an excellent choice for individuals who enjoy working outdoors and working with their hands. Graduates can find great careers with municipalities, electric cooperatives, tree trimming companies, construction, and more. Linemen are in high-demand and offer good benefit packages with an average salary of \$64,000 (*Indeed, June 2019*). If you like challenging and rewarding work, this is the program for you! Linemen are called to help restore power at all hours of the day and during storms and natural disasters.



MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNICIAN

Two-Year Associate in Applied Science Degree

The Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) program will begin in August 2020 pending approval from ICCB, IBHE, and HLC. Interested individuals may inquire about the program and request more information by contacting Kara Blanton, Academic Advisor, at blantonk@iecc.edu.

Medical laboratory technicians collect samples and perform analytical tests to help physicians diagnose and treat preventable diseases. Primary job duties include preparing specimens, accurately monitoring tests and procedures, analyzing chemical content of fluids, and matching blood for transfusions.

Technicians are expected to handle sophisticated lab equipment that searches for microorganisms, including cell counters, microscopes, and automated analyzers. MLT students will perform labs in a state-of-the-art classroom/laboratory (currently under construction), and they will also complete internships with local healthcare facilities to gain hands-on, real-world experience.

Once this program receives approval from accrediting bodies, a degree outline will be made available on our website. MLT-specific courses will include Serology, Immunohematology, Clinical Microbiology, Clinical Chemistry, Hematology & Homeostasis, and more.

GROWING OPPORTUNITIES

Graduates of the MLT program may find careers in hospitals, clinics, laboratories, and public health organizations. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the median pay is \$52,000 per year. The demand for jobs is also projected to grow 11 percent through 2028, much faster than the average for most occupations.

MLT graduates may also continue their education by enrolling in a Medical Laboratory Scientist (MLS) program at a 4-year university.

PARAMEDICINE

Two-Year Associate in Applied Science Degree





Paramedics are responsible for responding to emergency calls, performing medical services, and transporting patients to a medical facility if needed. Additionally, paramedics may also administer medications, interpret electrocardiograms (EKGs), and use monitors and equipment.

Graduates of the Paramedicine degree program will have the knowledge, attitudes, skills, habits, and hands-on experience needed to perform pre-hospital advanced life support as they respond to medical and traumatic emergencies under direct medical control.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the job outlook for paramedics is expected to grow by 7% through 2028, which is faster than other occupations. In 2018, the median annual wage was \$34,320 per year.

The Paramedicine program offers an Associate in Applied Science Degree, and classes for the degree will begin in 2020. In conjunction with Carle Richland Memorial Hospital (Olney, IL), students will receive classroom instruction and hands-on learning complete with state-of-the-art medical equipment and facilities.

SPORT MANAGEMENT

Two-Year Associate in Applied Science Degree

This degree provides entry-level employment training for individuals interested in careers with the rapidly growing sport and recreation industry. Employment settings may include sports fitness marketing and sales, sport retail management, athletic coaching positions, recreation planning, and more.

PHLEBOTOMY

One-Year Certificate

Phlebotomists are responsible for drawing blood for tests, donations, or transfusions in hospitals and laboratories. Those looking to quickly join the workforce and healthcare industry are encouraged to enroll in the Phlebotomy Program, which can be completed in just two semesters.

Students in the Phlebotomy program learn the techniques and procedures to collect blood from patients or donors for diagnostic testing. Additionally, ethical and legal responsibilities, effective communication, and safe practices are studied.

Clinicals are completed at local hospitals during the spring semester to prepare students for a career. By working under the supervision of a skilled phlebotomist, students gain real-world experience providing direct care, as well as receiving one-on-one training.











EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

After successfully completing the program, graduates are eligible to earn national certification from the American Society for Clinical Pathology.

Phlebotomists can be employed at hospitals, laboratories, blood banks and donor centers, home healthcare agencies, and more. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the demand for phlebotomists is projected to grow 23 percent through 2028, much faster than the average for other occupations.
